February 19, 2023 PM - Pastor Kevin Olivier Micah 2:7-13 – A Remnant Out of Destruction

- A. Dr. Edward McComiskey wrote some reasons why we ought to study the minor prophets.
- B. The prophet Micah foretold a coming judgment concerning Samaria & Jerusalem (<u>1:1</u>).
 - 1. This was largely due to idol worship which God described as spiritual harlotry.
 - 2. Chapter 2 also points to covetousness & theft of fields & homes. Our text continues with more examples of such theft.

I. DESTRUCTION DUE FOR WICKEDNESS

- A. Part of God's coming judgment involved the destruction of the idols some of God's people held so dear. In <u>1:7</u>, God foretold through Micah: "All of her idols will be smashed,... & all of her images I will make desolate."
- B. Besides from their pagan worship, God was going to bring great calamity because of how so many have treated their own Jewish brethren.
 - Micah 2:2: "They covet fields & then seize them, & houses, & take them away. They rob a man & his house, a man & his inheritance." Some of the wicked stole properties from the women as well. → v9
 - 2. It isn't enough to take the properties of others; some of the wicked even stole the clothing from those who passed by them. $\rightarrow \underline{v8}$
 - a. To steal garments from others is rather vile; a person cannot keep warm during the winter if he or she doesn't have enough to wear.
 - b. What makes matters worse is that some even stole from the veterans of war.
 - 1) Veterans should receive thanks & honor for their service.
 - 2) Instead, the wicked among God's covenant people took away their garments as they passed by unsuspecting such vile behavior.
 - 3) Such persons are less like citizens of one country; they rise up & act more like enemies than anything according to <u>v8</u>.
- C. All such selfish, vile wickedness will result in a painful destruction. \rightarrow <u>v10</u> God used foreign powers as His instruments of discipline.
- D. Micah gave a further accusation against the people because of their willingness to listen to false prophets. $\rightarrow \underline{v11}$ These sort of worshippers are common in our day as well as Paul warned. \rightarrow Look at <u>2 Tim 4:1-5</u>

II. GOD'S SALVATION OF THE REMNANT

- A. Such prophecies are not all destruction & chastisement; there is a hope of salvation here. \rightarrow <u>v12</u>
 - 1. God as a great Shepherd & His people like a flock is a theme often repeated in Scripture.
 - a. According to <u>Ps. 23</u>, those of us who have received salvation through Jesus Christ can say, "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside quiet waters" (vv1-2).
 - b. When Jesus began His earthly ministry, He proclaimed in <u>Jn 10:11</u>, "I am the good shepherd; the good shepherd lays down His life for the sheep." This truth is rooted i in <u>Ps 23</u> but especially in <u>Ezek 34:7-16</u>. Turn there.
 - 2. In <u>Micah 2:12</u>, the remnant will not be just a few. The flock is described as being "noisy with men."
- B. The next imagery of God gathering His flock together is one of a crowded pasture.
 - 1. When there are too many people at some events, it can become a dangerous situation.
 - God not only gathered His remnant to spare them of the destruction; He breaks them out so they can escape. → <u>v13</u> "The breaker goes up before them; they break out, pass through the gate & go out by it. So their king goes on before them, & the Lord at their head."
 - a. Not only does the Lord break them out; He leads them.
 - b. As you go your way, you do not have to fear because the Lord Jesus Christ, your Good Shepherd, leads you. <u>Ps 23:4</u> "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I fear no evil, for You are with me; your rod & Your staff, they comfort me."

C. In the final salvation of the elect, there will be a multitude which no man can number (<u>Rev 7:9</u>); however, in our day & age it seems we see a remnant of people who are truly devout & seeking the Lord.

1. When so many want to do what is right in their own sight, Jesus said in <u>Mat 7:13-14</u>, "Enter through the narrow gate; for the gate is wide & the way is broad that leads to destruction, & there are many who enter through it. ¹⁴ For the gate is small and the way is narrow that leads to life, and there are few who find it."

2. Follow the narrow way of Christ. He is the only way.
