Intro: Why does the 21st century church suffer from the lack of spiritual power? Might it be b/c we have forgotten our source of life?

- IX. Desiring God's Word
 - A. Remembering Our Source of Life vs 1a
 - 1. Therefore
 - a. refers back to 1:22-25 our redemption through the imperishable seed,
 - i. the word of God which endures forever
 - ii. The gospel that produces the new birth
 - b. "Therefore" was a concise reminder of the power of God's word
 - i. it was through God's word that He saved us Ro 1:16; 1Co 4:15; Jas 1:18
 - ii. it is through God's word that He transforms us Ro 12:2; 2Co 3:18; Eph 5:23; Col 3:10
 - 2. other scriptures that have concise reminders about the necessity of God's word
 - a. Ps 119:50 This is my comfort in my affliction, For Your word has given me life.
 - b. Ps 119:93 I will never forget Your precepts, For by them You have given me life.
 - c. Isa 55:11 So shall My word be that goes forth from My mouth; It shall not return to Me void, But it shall accomplish what I please, And it shall prosper in the thing for which I sent it.
 - d. Mt 4:4 But He answered and said, "It is written, 'Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God."
 - e. Ac 20:32 "So now, brethren, I commend you to God and to the word of His grace, which is able to build you up and give you an inheritance among all those who are sanctified.
 - f. Heb 4:12 For the word of God is living and powerful, and sharper than any two -edged sword, piercing even to the division of soul and spirit, and of joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart.
 - B. Putting Off Our Sins vs 1b
 - 1. laying aside Eph 4:22; Col 3:8; Heb 12:1; Jas 1:21;
 - a. apotithemi to put away:--cast off, lay apart (aside, down), put away (off).
 - b. Applied to any kind of rejection
 - c. Sometimes referred to stripping off dirty garments
 - d. a prerequisite to sustaining the desire for God's word
 - e. process of change in a Christian's life
 - i. initially, change happens in the big things,
 - ii. Then, stagnation or very slow growth due to
 - becoming comfortable with where we are in our spiritual walk
 - not believing what God says about our nature
 - 2. What are we putting off
 - a. all used here 3 times to emphasize totality
 - b. all malice
 - i. kakia badness, depravity, or (actively) malignity, or (passively) trouble:
 - --evil, malice(-iousness), naughtiness, wickedness.
 - ii. desiring to harm someone else

- c. all deceit Eph 4:25
 - i. dolos a trick (bait), wile:--craft, deceit, guile, subtilty.
 - ii. Lit. refers to bait or a fishhook
- d. hypocrisy
 - i. **hupokrisis** acting under a feigned part, deceit ("hypocrisy"):--condemnation, dissimulation, hypocrisy.
 - ii. Refers to spiritual insincerity and pretense
 - iii. Describes any behavior that is not genuine or consistent with what we profess that we believe
- e. envy
 - i. *phthonos* ill-will (as detraction), i.e. jealousy (spite):--envy.
 - ii. Defines the attitude of those who resent others b/c of their prosperity
 - iii. Often leads to grudges, bitterness, hatred, and conflict
- f. all evil speaking,
 - i. katalalia defamation:--backbiting, evil speaking.
 - ii. A word designed to sound like the whispers behind someone's back
- C. Admitting Our Need vs 2a 1. as newborn babes
 - a. artigennetos just born, i.e. (figuratively) a young convert:--new born.
 - b. brephos an infant (properly, unborn):--babe, (young) child, infant.
 - c. point emphasized by using both terms
 - 2. desire
 - a. *epipotheo* to dote upon, intensely crave possession (lawfully or wrongfully):--(earnestly) desire (greatly), (greatly) long (after), lust.
 - i. used 7 times Ro 1:11; 2 Co 5:2; 9:14; Phil 1:8; 2:26; 1 Th 3:6; 2 Ti 1:4
 - ii. Expresses an intense, recurring, insatiable desire or passion Ps 42:1; 119:174;
 - b. imperative commanding believers to strongly desire or crave something
 - 3. the pure milk of the word,
 - a. *adolos* undeceitful, unadulterated:--sincere.
 - b. *logikos* rational ("logical"):--reasonable, of the word.
 - i. not the normal translation Ro 12:1 spiritual, reasonable
 - ii. Originally rendered "belonging to speech" or "reason"
 - 4. Peter command is not to read, study, meditate, teach, preach, search, or memorize the word
 - i. The focus is on a more foundational level which believers need in order to pursue anything
 - ii. what kills desire
 - sin
 - Filling the desire with a replacement
- D. Pursuing Our Spiritual Growth vs 2b
 - 1. that purpose
 - 2. you may grow thereby
 - a. *auxano* to grow ("wax"), enlarge (literal or figurative, active or passive):-grow (up), (give the) increase.
 - i. passive verb lit. it may grow you
 - ii. used the same verb in 2Pe 3:18 but grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To Him be the glory both now and forever. Amen.
 - b. implies the necessity of discontent with present spiritual condition

i. Phil 3:7-14; 2 Pe 1:5-10

- ii. Motivation for genuine spiritual growth comes from discontent coupled with sincere desire for more
- E. Examining Ourselves in Respect to Blessings vs 3
 - 1. if indeed
 - a. begins a conditional clause that explains the facts or conditions necessary for the proposition to be true
 - b. if saved, desire the word
 - 2. you have tasted that the Lord is gracious.
 - a. geuomai to eat; to experience (good or ill):--eat, taste.
 - b. *chrestos* employed, useful (in manner or morals):--better, easy, good(-ness), gracious, kind.
 - c. if they had already experienced God's graciousness through salvation, they would want more
 - i. they should respond by pursuing holiness 1:13-21
 - ii. they should respond by loving others in the church 1:22-25
 - iii. they should respond by continually desiring God's word 2:1-3
